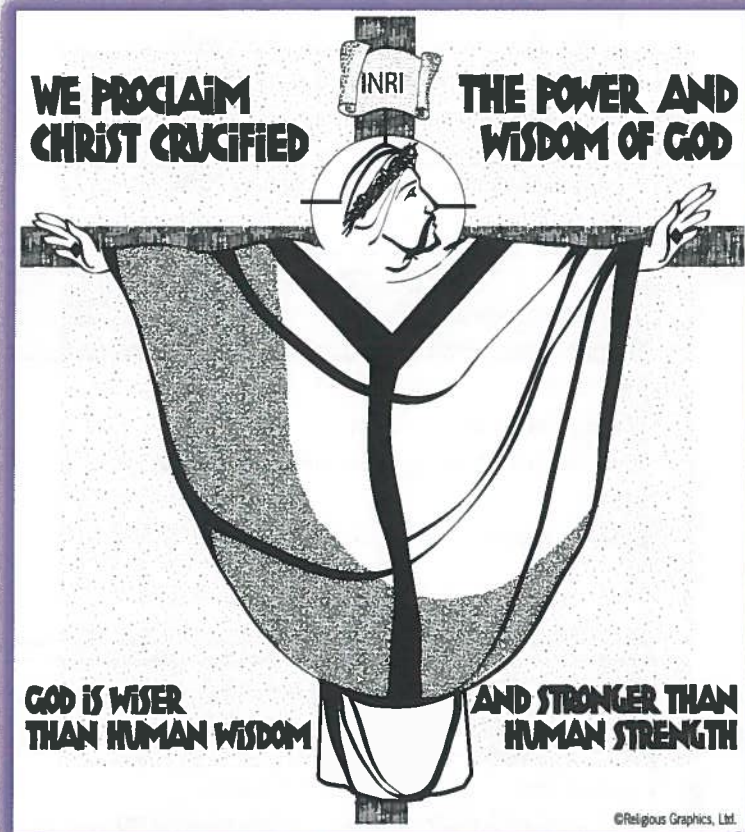

*Almsgiving opens our hearts to the realization that God blesses us through those we serve. It is here that we find the great mystery of Christian service.*

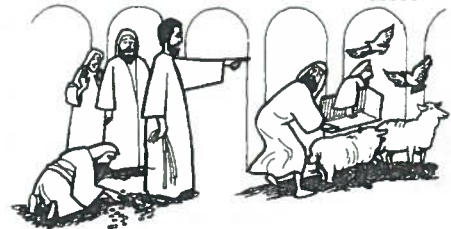


## Food Collection

**Saint of the week: St. John of God (March 8)** grew up working as a shepherd in the Castile region of Spain.



He led a wild and misspent youth, and travelled over much of Europe and north Africa as a soldier in the army of Charles V, and as a mercenary. He fought through a brief period of insanity. John peddled religious books and pictures in Gibraltar, though without any religious conviction himself. In his 40's he received a vision of the Infant Jesus who called him *John of God*. To make up for the misery he had caused as a soldier, he left the military, rented a house in Granada, Spain, and began caring for the sick, poor, homeless and the unwanted. He gave what he had, begged for those who couldn't, carried those who could not move on their own, and converted both his patients and those who saw him work with them. A friend of Saint John of Avila, on whom he tried to model his life. John founded the *Order of Charity* and the *Order of Hospitallers of Saint John of God*.



**Saints canonized by Pope Francis: St. Eufrosina of the Sacred Heart of Jesus Eluvathingal, (August 29)** was a nun in the *Congregation of the Mother of Carmel*, taking the name *Eufrosina of the Sacred Heart of Jesus*.

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

### Balancing act

Saint Paul lived in that perilous posture you see in cartoon characters whose feet are on opposite supports that are swiftly gliding apart. As a privileged Roman citizen of Cilicia (modern Turkey), Paul had one foot firmly planted in the reality of Greco-Roman culture. Yet the other was just as securely fixed in his Jewish faith. It was a tough posture to maintain. Then Paul encountered the Risen Lord and understood in the gospel the most excellent way to unite Jews and Greeks in an elegantly reconciling Christian message. Christianity is for uniting, not dividing.

TODAY'S READINGS: Year B; Exodus 20:1-17; I Corinthians 1:22-25; John 2:13-25 (29). *"Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified."*

This courageous woman, who escaped the chains of slavery and then led hundreds of slaves to freedom, reminds us that no matter the odds, no matter the restrictions, God gives us strength to reach for the stars and become the Love we were created to be. On this mid-March day, in the third week of Lent, perhaps we could use a

little encouragement to keep reaching for the stars as we respond to our Lenten call to love as God loves. Take one courageous step toward racial healing today.

### Stretch your heart

One year ago this week, COVID-19 began to seriously disrupt lives in North America. During this tumultuous year, everyone has suffered, whether from isolation, illness, unemployment, or another pandemic problem. Pope Francis has urged us to grow from these experiences: "if we are to come out of this crisis less selfish than when we went in, we have to let ourselves be touched by others' pain," he wrote. Has COVID-19 stretched your heart? Whether you give to a food pantry or call a shut-in, act on your compassion today.

LENTEN WEEKDAY, DAY OF ABSTINENCE

### Abstinence makes the heart grow fonder

As we practice Lenten abstinence today, we might keep in mind these words from fourth-century Saint Basil the Great: "True fast is the estrangement from evil, temperance of tongue, abstinence from anger, separation from desires, slander, falsehood, and perjury. Privation of these is true fasting." Being mindful of what goes into our mouths is important today, but being mindful of what comes out of them, even more so. Strive to abstain from the unkind, false, or hostile word today. And if you find you have broken the fast, make amends as best you can. Let this be your spiritual discipline today.

TODAY'S READINGS: Hosea 14:2-10; Mark 12:28-34 (241). *"You are not far from the kingdom of God."*

## Saturday, Mar 13, 2021

### Pray the mercy mantra

Gregory Palamas, a saint of the Eastern Orthodox, Melkite, and Ukrainian Catholic Churches, taught that the use of the Jesus Prayer—"Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner"—prepares one to receive the grace-filled light of the Lord. This short, formulaic prayer has its roots in today's parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector. Saint John Paul II repeatedly cited Palamas as one of the great spiritual writers of history. Today, join with John Paul II and Palamas in heaven and the multitude of Catholics throughout the world who recite this spiritual mantra over and over again seeking the Lord's mercy.

TODAY'S READINGS: Hosea 6:1-6; Luke 18:9-14 (242). *"For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted."*

*Invest just five minutes a day, and your faith will deepen and grow—a day at a time*



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## Blessed Margaret Part 7

In September, Parisio returned home, disbanded his army, and reported to the State Council on the war. When his meeting concluded Parisio rejoined his wife who was still living at Mercatello. They had much to talk about and Emilia told her husband about the German pilgrims that shared the news about miraculous cures occurring at Castello. Parisio found this amusing. He couldn't believe that his wife might believe in miracles. Emilia reminded her husband that St. Francis possessed great healing power but Parisio responded that he had that ability while alive, and few men have had such power. Parisio told his wife that miracles presuppose that God is deeply interested in our lives but both of us know that is sheer nonsense.

Emilia continued to defend her believe that miracles were occurring at the burial site of Fr. Giacomo and many people from all walks of life were reporting these miraculous events. Parisio began to lessen his objection when he learned that these pilgrims were well educated men. Then Emilia proposed her idea of taking Margaret there in hope of a miracle. Maybe she will be cured of her deformities or blindness. Emilia stated it is possible a miracle will take place. At first Parisio objected but then he stated if they left early in the morning they could reach Castello by sunset. Emilia had never been to Castello and was anxious to go there.

Parisio told his wife that he did not know what to do with "that creature" referring to his daughter, Margaret. With that he decided to take his wife and daughter to Castello. Emilia said a miracle may not happen but the priest preaching in the piazza declared all one needs is faith and Margaret has a lot of faith. The night before they left for Castello Emilia did not sleep well. The thought of the journey over the Apennine Mountains to a city they had never visited and the hope of a miracle worried her. At dawn Emilia woke her husband so they could set out.

They set out with a mounted escort consisting of twelve armed men. It was a cold, foggy morning and the group was heavily bundled up. The road was a miserable, unpaved, narrow road. There were no bridges along the route but the water was low due to the fall weather. By the end of the day they had reached a high ridge which overlooked the valley where Castello was located. The town was on level ground and visitors could see the entire town spread out before them. On arrival Parisio went to the inn to get shelter for his group, from there he went in search of the shrine. After seeing the shrine and listening to the local residents, Parisio, himself, became convinced that genuine miracles had occurred there. He had hope that Margaret might be cured.

He returned to the inn and shared with his family the stories people told him of their own cures. Parisio said to Margaret, tomorrow we will take you to the church, go to confession, and receive Holy Communion before we pray for your cure. Parisio's change of heart amazed his wife. Parisio asked Margaret to pray with her whole heart for a complete cure. This was the first time Parisio called his daughter "dear child". Never before had Parisio ever mention the sacraments and prayer to Margaret. So moved was Margaret that tears of joy came to her eyes.
